

Executive Committee's Report

The Executive Committee of The Hospital Broadcasting Service are pleased to submit their report and accounts for the year 1st January to 31st December 2021.

The Hospital Broadcasting Service (also known On-Air as 'HBS') is registered with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator and governed by a Constitution.

This report and attached accounts have been prepared in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The accounts are prepared on a Receipts and Payments basis.

The accounts are produced on a cash basis and do not take account of any future anticipated income or expenditure. As such there are no reserves held to fund future projects. The Studio Development fund contains donations for specific projects e.g. upgrade studios and provision of recording equipment, but these funds are not available for running costs.

Charitable Objects

The objects of The Service shall be to relieve sickness, infirmity, handicap and old age amongst persons living in the area served by providing a local broadcasting service for hospitals, residential homes, nursing homes for the elderly and other similar establishments.

The radio station currently broadcasts to bedside radios of approximately three thousand patients in the following establishments:

- Beatson Oncology Centre (West of Scotland Cancer Centre)
- Gartnavel General Hospital
- Queen Elizabeth University Hospital
- Royal Alexandra Hospital

Most hospital-based listening is via the bedside entertainment equipment. Increasingly though patients are accessing programmes through internet streaming.

Organisation

The Hospital Broadcasting Service is run entirely by volunteers, who pay an annual membership subscription. Members are not reimbursed for any out-of-pocket expenses. It is an unincorporated association governed by a Constitution and managed by an Executive Committee elected by the membership at the Annual General Meeting.

Related Organisations

The Hospital Broadcasting Service is a member of the Hospital Broadcasting Association (HBA), the national charity that is an umbrella organisation which supports and promotes hospital broadcasting in the UK. Our members regularly interact with the office bearers of HBA and when available attend the annual conference and training days they organise.

The Hospital Broadcasting Service maintains a close working relationship with NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde including, where possible, formal quarterly management meetings.

Review of Activities

The entire year saw various levels of restrictions placed on the activities of our volunteers as continued social distancing significantly impact the operations of The Service.

The biggest impact to volunteering was the inability to get access to hospital wards and meet directly with patients, a core activity of the organisation for the previous 50 years. This resulted in a number of our long-serving members having no role to perform as they are entirely focussed on face-to-face patient interaction, preferring not to try their hand at broadcasting.

The main hospital site (Queen Elizabeth University Hospital) suffered from some local technical issues meaning our programmes were not available on the bedside entertainment units for more than three months, a situation exacerbated by lockdown restrictions and the ability of the system provider's technical staff to travel to site and investigate the problem. Our internet streaming option did however remain available throughout the year and provided an alternate listening option for those with personal digital devices.

Alternate ways of connecting with patients were attempted during the year. Ongoing discussions with NHS management to review these and find suitable Covid-compliant options were also undertaken, however none were as effective as our traditional ward-visiting approach.

Despite the restrictions, programmes continued to be broadcast with only minimal impact on the schedule. The nightly request show was reduced by one edition per week but all other programmes continued to be broadcast although in some cases this was achieved with a rota of presenters as some volunteers reviewed their ongoing availability.

Last year (2020) the production office was refurbished to make it more suitable for people with physical disabilities and also remodelled to suit a 'digital audio' environment with vinyl, tape and CD no longer in daily use. This year the continuation of the refurbishment project saw the studios being refreshed. This was done in parallel to an additional project funded by the National Lottery 'Awards for All' scheme, designed to deal with keeping the studio temperatures at a more acceptable level for a working environment.

The initial temperature-control solution was going to be based on air-conditioning equipment however a review of both Covid mitigation and equipment running costs identified that a significantly increased flow of fresh air would be a more appropriate solution. The majority of this work was completed during the year with final completion works rolling-over to 2022.



Through the year many of the team returned to broadcasting from the central studios in Baltic Chambers, plus we also added a new show from a former volunteer who re-joined with programmes from his home in America.
